This amendment was submitted to DLCD for review prior to adoption pursuant to ORS 197.830(2)(b) only persons who participated in the local government proceedings leading to adoption of the amendment are eligible to appeal this decision to the Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA).

If you wish to appeal, you must file a notice of intent to appeal with the Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA) no later than 21 days from the date the decision was mailed to you by the local government. If you have questions, check with the local government to determine the appeal deadline. Copies of the notice of intent to appeal must be served upon the local government and others who received written notice of the final decision from the local government. The notice of intent to appeal must be served and filed in the form and manner prescribed by LUBA, (OAR Chapter 661, Division 10). Please call LUBA at 503-373-1265, if you have questions about appeal procedures.

*NOTE: The Acknowledgment or Appeal Deadline is based upon the date the decision was mailed by local

government. A decision may have been mailed to you on a different date than it was mailed to DLCD. As a result, your appeal deadline may be earlier than the above date specified. NO LUBA Notification to the jurisdiction of an appeal by the deadline, this Plan Amendment is acknowledged.

ORDINANCE BILL NO. 2-10

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO NEIGHBORHOODS, AMENDING SRC 64.250 and SRC 64.280; AMENDING AND RENUMBERING SRC 64.290, SRC 64.320, SRC 64.350, SRC 64.310, SRC 64.260, SRC 64.270, SRC 64.360, SRC 64.370, SRC 64.380, SRC 64.400, SRC 64.410, SRC 64.420, and SRC 64.430; REPEALING SRC 64.300, SRC 64.330, SRC 64.340, SRC 64.390, and SRC 64.440 AND CREATING NEW PROVISIONS

The City of Salem ordains as follows:

Section 1. SRC 64.250 is amended to read as follows:

64.250. Purpose of Neighborhood Association Program is: (a) to involve citizens in local government planning and decision-making that as it affects the development of their neighborhoods and the City as a whole: It is the intent of this chapter to provide an effective mechanism whereby the citizens of the city sharing common neighborhood identity, goals, and concerns, may form neighborhood associations organizations and undertake an become officially recognized as advisory role for bodies to the Council and to all boards and commissions engaged in community planning and development; and (b) to provide a mechanism for citizens, through their neighborhood associations, organization, to provide input to Council on livability and quality of life issues affecting their neighborhood and the City as a whole.

Section 2. The following SRC 64.255 is added to SRC Chapter 64:

64.255. Definitions. As used in SRC 64.250-64.335, the following mean:

- (a) City Manager means the City Manager or the department head charged by the City Manager with the implementation and administration of SRC 64.250-64.335 or that department head's designee.
- (b) Designated neighborhood means the geographical area of the city encompassed by the neighborhood association.

Section 3. SRC 64.290 is renumbered as SRC 64.260 and amended to read as follows:

64.260.64.290. Procedure for Initial Recognition of Neighborhood Association.

(a) When interest has been expressed by a number of <u>persons who are</u> residents, <u>businesses owners</u>, or property owners to form a neighborhood association, a request may

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a request shall be made to the City Manager department of community services for city staff assistance. After informal meetings with City staff shall organize informal meetings with and interested residents, businesses, and property owners, and shall assist in determining the geographical area of the proposed neighborhood association, and provide background and information on the neighborhood program. If the residents determine that forming a neighborhood association is desirable, one or more neighborhood wide meetings for the area identified for the proposed neighborhood association shall be held to increase awareness of the neighborhood program and to allow a formally request for recognition as an official neighborhood organization association to be approved. (b) A The-request for recognition as an official neighborhood association shall will be considered by the planning commission and forwarded with its recommendation to the City Council. If the group requesting recognition satisfies the requirements of SRC 64.280(a), the City Council shall adopt a resolution officially recognizing the neighborhood association. The resolution shall include a description of the designated neighborhood. Once the neighborhood association group has been recognized, by council resolution, the council and planning commission will look to the neighborhood association will serve as the official citizen organization for the designated neighborhood. <u>Section 4.</u> SRC 64.320 is renumbered as SRC 64.265 and amended to read as follows:

<u>64.265.64.320.</u> Notice of Initial Recognition. Upon formal As soon as practical after recognition by the City <u>Council.</u> the <u>City Manager mayor</u>-shall <u>send eause</u>-a letter to be sent in his or her name to all property owners, residents, and businesses to known property addresses identified within <u>the designated neighborhood identified in the resolution recognizing</u> the neighborhood <u>association.</u> The <u>mayor's</u>-letter shall include: <u>the following:</u>

- (a) A statement encouraging all property owners, residents, and businesses within the newly recognized neighborhood <u>association</u> to participate in meetings, preparation of neighborhood plans, and other activities leading to proposals and recommendations to <u>the</u> City. government.
- (b) A map description of the neighborhood boundaries.
- (c) The names, addresses, and telephone numbers and contact information of all officers

of the neighborhood association. organization.

- (d) A list of all standing committees and a description of each.
- (de) The names <u>and contact information for the City staff</u> of persons and departments within city government who will be serving as the primary contacts with the neighborhood <u>association</u>. <u>organization</u>.

Section 5. SRC 64.350 is renumbered as SRC 64.270 and amended to read as follows:

64.270.64.350. Incorporation of Newly Annexed Areas Territory into Neighborhood

Associations. Whenever territory an area that is not within the boundaries of an existing neighborhood organization is annexed to the City, and the area is contiguous to a designated neighborhood, that neighborhood association may submit a request to the City Council for the planning commission shall, within 30 days of the effective date of the annexation, solicit the input of affected neighborhood associations and recommend to the council one of the following alternatives:

- (a) That the <u>territory</u> area-be added to the <u>geographical area</u> territory of <u>the</u> an existing neighborhood <u>association</u> erganization;
- (b) That the <u>territory area</u> be <u>considered for recognition</u> recognized as the nucleus of a new neighborhood <u>association</u> organization and its <u>residents be</u> eitizens encouraged immediately to seek recognition; as a new neighborhood organization; or
- (c) That the area be-recognized considered for recognition as the nucleus of a new neighborhood association, organization, but because it is yet undeveloped, or is of too small, a size, it that the territory should be temporarily represented by another neighborhood association, organization. in which case such an event the neighborhood association making the request temporary representative organization shall function as the neighborhood association for the territory, provided, however that such neighborhood association in all respects as though the area were within its boundaries except that it shall not develop any neighborhood plan for the territory. Section 6. SRC 64.310 is renumbered as SRC 64.275 and amended to read as follows:
64.275.64.310. Procedures for Annual Review of Neighborhood Association Status.
Annual Review of Neighborhood Organization Status.

(a) Within 60 sixty days following the an-annual general meeting for electing board

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members, a the neighborhood association shall organization will provide the City Manager Salem Planning Commission with evidence of compliance with the standards set forth in SRC 64.280(b).

- (b) The report will be reviewed by the City Manager. The City Manager may request such additional information or documentation that the City Manager deems necessary to establish compliance with the standards set forth in SRC 64.280(b). Planning commission and city council. If, after review, the City Manger finds that the neighborhood association has established compliance with the standards set forth in SRC 64.280(b), then the City Manager shall send a notice to the neighborhood association. indicating continued recognition of the neighborhood association. If, after review, the City Manager finds that the neighborhood association has failed to establish compliance the report establishes indicates noncompliance with the standards set forth in SRC 64.280(b), the City Manager shall send a notice of non-compliance to the neighborhood association organization will be asked to take-identifying the deficiencies, and the corrective action which would be necessary.
- (c) Upon receipt of a notice of non-compliance, the neighborhood association shall, within sixty days of the notice, notify the City Manager of the date the corrective action will be completed, or provide the City Manager with an action plan to correct the deficiencies. If the corrective action will take more than three months to complete, then the neighborhood association shall provide an action plan, which shall include a timeline for completion. If corrective action is found necessary by the city council and such action not completed within the date specified by the neighborhood association, or no action plan is provided to the City Manager not taken within 60sixty days following the notice council notifying the neighborhood organization of noncompliance, or timelines in the corrective action plan are not met, recognition of the neighborhood association organization will shall be suspended.
- (d) A neighborhood association which has had recognition suspended pursuant to subsection (c) of this section may request reinstatement by filing a request with the City Manager, in writing, not later than one year from the date the notice of non-compliance was provided to the neighborhood association. The request shall include documentation

demonstrating that the neighborhood association satisfies all criteria set forth in SRC 64.280(a) and that it is capable of satisfying all the criteria set forth in SRC 64.280(b). If the City Manager finds that the neighborhood association's request satisfies all criteria set forth in SRC 64.280(a) and that it is capable of satisfying all the criteria set forth in SRC 64.280(b), the City Manager shall issue a notice of reinstatement. Recognition of a neighborhood association shall be terminated by resolution of the City Council if the neighborhood association fails to timely request reinstatement as provided in subsection (c) of this section, or fails to demonstrate satisfaction of all criteria set forth in SRC 64.280(a) and capability of satisfying all the criteria set forth in SRC 64.280(b) in its request for reinstatement.

Section 7. SRC 64.280 is amended to read as follows:

64.280. Standards for Recognition. Of Neighborhood Organizations.

- (a) A neighborhood <u>association</u>, in order to obtain initial recognition, organization-shall meet and continue to maintain <u>meet</u> conformity with the following minimum-standards: for official recognition:
 - (<u>1a</u>) That one or more well-publicized general neighborhood meetings have been held for the purpose of information and approval of boundaries, organizational objectives, and bylaws.
 - (2b) That bylaws provide for the following:
 - (A1) A decision-making process for the organization association.
 - (B2) Minutes of all official board and general meetings to be taken and filed with the department of community services <u>City Manager</u>.
 - (<u>C</u>3) Participation open to any resident, property owner, or business in the neighborhood.
 - (<u>3e</u>) That the <u>organization's association's</u> structure is capable of providing necessary communication between the neighborhood residents and elected and appointed City officials.
 - (<u>4d</u>) That the neighborhood <u>organization</u> association has an awareness of its duties and responsibilities with respect to the neighborhood <u>association organization</u> program;

(<u>5e</u>) That the contiguous geographical boundaries of the neighborhood organization
association should be the centerlines, when an arterial street is used as a boundary, or
at some other clearly defined and relatively permanent natural or man-made feature.

- (6f) That the territory of the neighborhood is logical, represents a community of interest and identity as a neighborhood, and supports the City's intent that all areas within the city be represented by a neighborhood organization association and that no area be represented by more than one neighborhood organization association.
- (7) Notices of organizational meetings prior to official recognition of the neighborhood association have been distributed to known property owners, residents, and businesses in the proposed designated neighborhood.
- (g) That the neighborhood organization has met-with city staff and formally requested recognition by the planning commission and council.
- (b) A neighborhood association shall, in order to maintain official recognition, meet the following standards:
 - (1) The neighborhood association has held an annual well-publicized general neighborhood meeting for the election of board members.
 - (2) The neighborhood association has made reasonable efforts to notify all residents, property owners, and businesses in the geographical area encompassed by the neighborhood association of board and general meetings, studies, and other activities of the neighborhood association.
 - (3) The bylaws of the neighborhood association have not been amended to eliminate the requirements of subsection (a)(2) of this section.
 - (4) Minutes of all official board and general meetings of the neighborhood association have been taken and filed with the City Manager.
 - (5) The neighborhood association has established one or more civic involvement goals.
 - (6) If the neighborhood association is organized as a non-profit corporation, that it has maintained its filings with the Oregon Secretary of State, and has maintained its status in good standing.

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- (mh) Prepare Preparation of a neighborhood plan as City staff and funding are available.
- (<u>ni</u>) <u>Assist Assistance</u>-in implementing the adopted neighborhood plan.
- (oj) <u>Consider Consideration of involvement in community service activities that could</u> benefit the neighborhood or the city in general.
- (<u>pk</u>) <u>Coordinate</u> Coordination with watershed councils whose boundaries overlap the neighborhood <u>association's</u> organization's boundaries.
- Section 10. SRC 64.270 is renumbered as SRC 64.295 and amended to read as follows:
 - 64.295.64.270. City Support of Neighborhood Associations; Advisory Role to City. City Responsibilities. Once A recognized neighborhood association will, organization is officially recognized, it shall be accorded the following services and consideration by the eity, subject to availability of resources, as determined by the City Manager, receive the following from the City:
 - (a) A-City representative to act-as liaison staff, who will with other city departments and agencies; to conduct research, and provide information, and to assist the neighborhood association in organizational development and maintenance and implementation of the neighborhood associations' projects.
 - (b) Mailing, printing, clerical, and graphic services to assist the neighborhood organization association.
 - (c) Grants of financial assistance for communication to members and outreach to the geographic area encompassed by the neighborhood association.
 - (<u>de</u>) Assistance of <u>in the preparation and neighborhood planning team in order to prepare and update of a-neighborhood plans.</u>
 - (ed) Timely notice to the neighborhood organization of any proposals affecting the geographic area encompassed by the neighborhood association that are to come before advisory boards and <u>City</u> Council.
 - (<u>fe</u>) Solicitation of <u>the a</u> neighborhood <u>association's organization's position</u> and reasoning on any issue especially affecting <u>the geographic area encompassed by the that neighborhood association.</u>

- (a) A neighborhood plan is a <u>written</u> plan <u>embodying citizen desires on encompassing</u> a broad range of concerns and including in a designated the entire neighborhood. area. The <u>purpose of</u> a neighborhood plan is to provide more detailed goals and policies for the <u>designated</u> neighborhood as a refinement of and in a manner consistent with the Salem Area Comprehensive Plan. It shall be considered as applying to a shorter time frame than the comprehensive plan.
- (b) The neighborhood plan shall be the basis for any neighborhood association's recommendation to any city board, commission, or agency. The city board, commission or agency shall consider the neighborhood plan in making any decision or recommendation which would affect the designated neighborhood. The City Council may consider the neighborhood plan before making any final decision as to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of public facilities in the designated neighborhood.

Section 12. The following SRC 64.305 is added to SRC Chapter 64:

- 64.305. Development of a Neighborhood Plan. The development of a neighborhood plan for a designated neighborhood may be initiated by a recognized neighborhood association, or by the Planning Administrator, after obtaining concurrence from the recognized neighborhood association. The Planning Administrator may initiate the development of a neighborhood plan for any area of the city for which there is no neighborhood association, if authorized by the City Council.
- Section 13. SRC 64.370 is renumbered as SRC 64.310 and amended to read as follows: 64.310.64.370. Scope of Neighborhood Plan.
 - (a) A neighborhood plan shall should address each of the following elements:
 - (1) Land use;
 - (2) Transportation;
 - (3) Public facilities and services:
 - (4) Housing: and
 - (5) Parks, recreation, and open spaces.

- (b) In addition, the A neighborhood plan may address other subjects of particular concern to the neighborhood, such as:
 - (1) Economic development; activity
 - (2) Social services;
 - (3) Environmental quality; and
 - (4) Urban design,
- (c) The A neighborhood plan should include the following:
 - (1) Goals and policy statements:
 - (2) Generalized land use map:
 - (3) Such-Maps and diagrams as may that assist in showing the application of goal and policy statements in the plan; and
- (4) Recommendations as to any element addressed in the neighborhood plan.

 Section 14. SRC 64.380 is renumbered as SRC 64.315 and amended to read as follows:

 64.315.64.380. Time Frame and Phasing.
 - (a) Neighborhood plans, particularly maps and detailed land use statements therein, should be reviewed biennially and should focus on a time span of at least five to ten years.
 - (b) Within the time span of the <u>neighborhood</u> plan, the timing or phasing of specific applications of policies may depend upon the happening of future events, or may depend upon predicted growth over a particular time period. The neighborhood plan should specify the preconditions or timing of such policies and their application.
 - (c) Neighborhood plans should be reviewed periodically.
- Section 15. SRC 64.400 is renumbered as SRC 64.320 and amended to read as follows:

 64.320.64.400. Elements of Neighborhood Plan Which May Be Adopted as Part of the Salem Area Comprehensive Plan.
 - (a) Only the goals and policy statements in a of the neighborhood plan, and any generalized land use map, projecting those goals and policies, shall be considered for adoption, as part of the Salem Area Comprehensive Plan. The goals, policies and generalized land use map that are adopted shall be consistent with the Salem Area Comprehensive Plan and the statewide planning goals. Specific recommendations as to

<u>land use zoning</u> or public improvements shall not be adopted, but <u>may should</u> be considered <u>in making legislative land use decisions affecting the designated</u>
<u>neighborhood</u>. and acted upon separately.

(b) In the event of any conflict between an adopted neighborhood plan and the Statewide Planning Goals, the Salem Area Comprehensive Plan, or the Salem Revised Code, the Statewide Planning Goals, the Salem Area Comprehensive Plan, or the Salem Revised Code shall control.

<u>Section 16.</u> SRC 64.410 is renumbered as SRC 64.325 and amended to read as follows: 64.325.64.410. Process for Development Initiation of Neighborhood Plans.

- (a) Property owners, residents, and businesses within the <u>designated</u> neighborhood shall be afforded maximum opportunity for involvement in all phases of the preparation of a neighborhood plan. Notification of all general neighborhood and board meetings where the <u>proposed neighborhood</u> plan will be discussed, and notification of the process by which the <u>neighborhood</u> plan is being prepared shall be given <u>by the neighborhood</u> association. as provided in SRC 64.330 and 64.340.
- (b) Proposed neighborhood plans must be presented at a minimum of two informational neighborhood—public meetings in the designated neighborhood. In addition to these public meetings, the neighborhood association organization is encouraged to should use other means of contacting citizens to obtain their-input and review of the neighborhood plan. A specific effort should be made by neighborhood organizations to obtain the opinions of from property owners, residents, and businesses who would be directly affected by the proposed neighborhood plan.
- (c) The final draft neighborhood plan shall be adopted by resolution of the neighborhood association's organization's governing board and affirmed by vote of the membership at a general or annual neighborhood-meeting.
- (d) The process for official-adoption of the neighborhood plan by the City is deemed initiated upon a filing of the that resolution and a copy of the final draft neighborhood plan with the Planning Administrator. secretary of the planning commission.

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Section 17. SRC 64.420 is renumbered as SRC 64.330 and amended to read as follows: 64.330.64.420. Planning Commission Action on Neighborhood Plans.

- (a) Prior to holding public hearing as provided in SRC 64.080, The Planning Commission and official representatives of the neighborhood association shall hold a joint work session with representatives of the neighborhood organization. The purpose of such work session shall be to give the Planning Commission and the neighborhood organization an opportunity to exchange comments about the neighborhood plan, to identify any areas of potential disagreement, and to give the neighborhood association organization an opportunity to refine its plan. prior to the public hearing. Such work session should shall be held within four weeks of the date receipt of the final draft neighborhood plan is filed with the Planning Administrator. At such work session the neighborhood association organization shall demonstrate prove-compliance with the provisions of SRC 64.325. 64.410.
- (b) Based upon the work session described in subsection (a) of this section the neighborhood <u>association organization</u> shall, within 60sixty days after the work session, submit <u>a notice of completion to the Planning Administrator</u>, which shall include any additions, modifications, or deletions it wishes to make to it's the final draft neighborhood plan, or <u>a statement that notify the Planning Commission that</u> it wishes to make no changes.
- (c) The Planning Commission shall hold a public hearing on the final draft neighborhood plan within 30thirty days following the submission of the notice of completion by the neighborhood association under organization's action described in subsection (b) of this section. Notice of the such hearing shall be given as provided for major plan changes in SRC 64.080. The Planning Commission shall forward its recommendation concerning the neighborhood plan to the City Council, recorder along with the recommendations within thirty 15-days of the conclusion of its deliberations, thereafter unless the neighborhood association organization requests a further work session as provided in subsection (d) of this section.
- (d) If, after the public hearing before the Planning Commission, the neighborhood <u>association organization</u> so requests, the Planning Commission shall schedule a further

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 joint work session to be held for the purposes and in the manner specified in subsection

(a) of this section. The request shall be made within seven days of the close of the public hearing, and the work session should shall be held within thirty14 days of the request.

The neighborhood association shall proceed as provided in subsection (b) of this section.

Within thirty15 days of receipt of the notice of completion, after the joint work session the Planning Administrator Commission-shall forward the final draft neighborhood plan, as modified, the neighborhood plan to the city recorder along with the Planning Commission's its-recommendations to the City Council.

Section 18. SRC 64.430 is renumbered as SRC 64.335 and amended to read as follows:

64.335,64.430. Council Adoption Action of Neighborhood Plan. The City Council shall hold a public hearing on the final draft neighborhood plan within 120 days following receipt of the Planning Commission's recommendation from the Planning Administrator. Notice of the hearing shall be given as provided for major plan changes in SRC 64.080. Following public hearing, as provided in SRC 64.420, the common City Council shall either recommend changes to the neighborhood plan or adopt such portions thereof it deems as are deemed appropriate, under SRC 64.390. If the City Council recommends changes, the neighborhood association organization may either revise it's the neighborhood plan and resubmit it for adoption by the City Council or it may notify the City Council that it declines to amend its plan further, in which case the City Council may adopt the plan as originally submitted or abandon the adoption process. In no event shall the council adopt any portion of a neighborhood plan which portion is in conflict with the rest of the comprehensive plan. Section 19. SRC 64.300, SRC 64.330, SRC 64.340, SRC 64.390, and SRC 64.440 are hereby repealed.

64.300. Recognition of Existing Neighborhood Organizations. A neighborhood organization which was officially recognized by resolution of the common council on or before the effective date of this ordinance shall be deemed recognized for purposes of this chapter without further proceedings.

64.330. Notification of Neighborhood Action; City Policy.

(a)—It is the policy of the City of Salem that pursuant to the requirements of this chapter, all affected property owners, residents, and businesses be reasonably notified of
