

The bridge crosses the Whilamut Natural Area of Alton Baker Park. The Kalapuya word, Whilamut, means "where the river ripples and runs fast," and is likely the derivation of the word, Willamette.

Why the Kalapuyas?

- The Kalapuyas have crossed the Willamette River for many thousands of years.
- The bridge crosses over the Whilamut Natural Area of Alton Baker Park. The park is named from the Kalapuya word, Whilamut, which means, "where the river ripples and runs fast." The bridge naming is a logical extension of the park naming.



- A Kalapuya name/design symbolizes a love of our beautiful natural Oregon, a value held dear to the citizens of our area.
- Since the Kalapuya territory was what is now called the central Willamette Valley, the name designates our particular geographic site.
- Because of a relatively shallow rock surface at the site, the Willamette River will be rippling and running fast under the bridge for decades to come.
